Supreme Chaplain's Message

uring a recent visit to New Haven, I was asked to bless several pallets loaded with more than 30,000 rosaries. In fact, I bless large numbers of rosaries whenever I'm at the Supreme Council headquarters. The reason is that a rosary is given to every Knight of Columbus when he becomes a member. I still have the rosary I was given when I became a Knight in 1986 and a few newer ones to spare. A rosary is "standard operating equipment" — if I might use that phrase — for every Knight. Members of the Knights and their families are encouraged by the Order to pray the rosary daily. Indeed, every Catholic should try to pray the rosary frequently. And what better month than May — dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary — for us to revisit this devotion

By word and example, Pope Francis certainly encourages us to pray the rosary. The Holy Father prays 15 decades of the rosary daily and often can be seen praying it in public. He has even written a pocket-sized book of meditations on the mysteries of the rosary. Through these easy-to-read reflections, Pope Francis invites us to ask the help of Mary so that our hearts might be prepared to enter into the mysteries of Christ's life.

The pope also talks about the rosary in his addresses and homilies. In one Angelus address, for instance, he called the rosary "spiritual medicine ... for the heart, the soul and the whole of life." On another occasion, he pulled a rosary from his pocket, held it up, and asked the people if they too had rosaries. Then, he asked if they merely carry the

rosary in their pockets or if they actually pray it!

We might ask why it is that popes, great saints and pastors, and masters of the spiritual life are nearly unanimous in urging us to pray the rosary. Many others have answered that question more convincingly than I ever could. Yet, emboldened by the Blessed Mother's love for me, I am willing to try! And I'd like to take my cue from a prayer that is often recited at the end of the rosary. It goes like this:

"O God, whose only begotten Son, by his life, death and resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal salvation: Grant, we beseech thee, that while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may both imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through Christ our Lord. Amen."

Let's consider two phrases in that prayer: 1) "meditating on these mysteries of the most holy rosary" and 2) "imitate what they [the mysteries of the rosary] contain and obtain what they promise." I believe that these two phrases can help deepen our understanding of the rosary and motivate us to pray it daily.

First, this concluding prayer reminds us that the rosary is a prayer for meditation on the mysteries of the life of Christ.

Supreme Chaplain's Message (Continued)

In a daily Mass homily, Pope Francis said that prayer is not mindlessly repeating words "like a parrot!" The rosary, too, is not merely a matter of saying Our Fathers and Hail Marys. Rather, when we address the Blessed Mother using the words of the archangel Gabriel — "Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you!" (Lk 1:28) — she calms our spirit and leads us to Jesus. She helps us enter into the "mysteries" of her Son's life.

When we refer to the "mysteries" of the rosary, we do not mean something that is difficult or even impossible to explain. Rather, the word "mysteries" refers to events in the earthly life of Christ that reveal the saving work of our heavenly Father. Mary, who shared in these events like no one else, guides us through the incarnation, birth and childhood of Jesus (joyful mysteries); through the events of Jesus' public life that manifested the Father's glory (luminous mysteries); through Jesus' saving passion and death (sorrowful mysteries); and through the triumph of the Lord over sin and death (glorious mysteries).

By allowing Mary to help us to reflect prayerfully on these events in the life of Christ, we begin to "imitate what they contain." For example, the first joyful mystery is the Annunciation. As we greet Mary and ask her intercession, we ponder the news that the angel Gabriel

brought — the birth of the Savior. We should be moved to give thanks and praise to God for loving the world so much that he sent us his only Son (cf. Jn 3:16). We should also ponder Mary's response to this astonishing news: "Let it be done to me according to thy word!"

When we pray each successive Hail Mary attentively, we always receive some benefit for our spiritual life. The Good News that the angel brought might dispel our gloomy outlook and rekindle our Christian hope. The response of Mary might challenge our tendency to be a Christian on our own terms, not the Lord's.

As we enter into the mysteries of Christ's life, we also "obtain what they promise" — first and foremost the blessedness and joy of growing in the likeness of Christ. This overarching blessing is specified in the 15 promises of the Blessed Mother to those who pray the rosary, as promoted by the Dominican order — promises that strengthen our hope for eternal life and that give us encouragement in the misfortunes and challenges of life.

In this month of May — and in every month thereafter — let us put our K of C rosaries to good use!

As we continue to celebrate the Easter Season and how to spread Our Lord's message of love to the world, please consider this:



rothers all, I wish you a wonderful May -- the month of Mary! The Queen of Heaven is so revered for her relationship with Christ and her love and guidance of her earthly children, the Catholic Church has dedicated the month of May in her honor.

In his 1965 encyclical, "Mense Maio," Pope Paul VI wrote about the importance of Mary's intercession for all the world, explaining that those who encounter her, encounter her Son, Jesus.

Pope Paul VI went on to write May is the month Christians offer the Virgin Mother more "fervent and loving acts of homage and veneration; and it is the month in which a greater abundance of God's merciful gifts comes down to us from our Mother's throne."

During the month of May, we honor her motherly and queenly majesty from every corner of the earth.

Pope Francis consecrated his papacy to Mary, under the title of Our Lady of Fatima, and he invited everyone to consecrate themselves to her tender, loving care.

By faith, we become the sons and daughters of Jesus, so it should be natural for us to ask Mary to intercede on our behalf.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church calls Mary our model of faith and charity, and devotion to the Blessed Virgin is intrinsic to Christian worship.

"The Church rightly honors the Blessed Virgin with special devotion. From the most ancient times the Blessed Virgin has been honored with the title of 'Mother of God,' to whose protection the faithful fly in all their dangers and needs...This very special devotion...differs essentially from the adoration which is given to the incarnate Word and equally to the Father and the Holy Spirit, and greatly fosters this adoration. The liturgical feasts dedicated to the Mother of God and Marian prayer, such as the rosary, an epitome of the whole Gospel, expresses this devotion to the Virgin Mary."

Traditionally, the month of October is "rosary month" in the Catholic Church while the month of May is devoted to the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Among the most prominent Marian feast days in May, according to the ordinary Roman Catholic Calendar:

May 1, Queen of Heaven; May 13, Our Lady of Fatima; May 24, Mary Help of Christians; and May 31, Visitation of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

St. Bernard was quoted as saying, "If the winds of temptation arise, look at your star, invoke Mary; if the greatness of your crimes troubles you, think of Mary."

ack in the '70s, I supervised a caseload of drug abusers in Southwest Baltimore. One man ran off completely, but then he telephoned months later asking for help. I answered with the unofficial agency response, "Tell it to the Judge."

About three months later the local paper gave us an

update. He had been found floating face down in a molasses tanker car owned by the Chessie system.

I concluded that the unofficial policy must change. The next time something like that happened I told the man to enter the Salvation Army [It's free], and have his counselor call me when he got there. Thus we had created "Rest Without Arrest," a no fault response where the client could get well before seeing the Judge. This has saved lives over the years, both lives of my clients and their potential victims as well.

TODAY'S IGNORED MARTYRS

SIS is carrying out its vow to systematically kill and persecute Christians in countries of the Middle East and North Africa. On Palm Sunday, as Holy Week began, Islamic State suicide bombers in Egypt exploded their lethal weapons in two Coptic Christian churches, killing 47 people and injuring more than 100 others. Shortly before last Christmas, a suicide bomber killed 30 worshipers in St. Mark's Cathedral in Cairo. On February 15, 2015, ISIS beheaded 21 Coptic Christians on a beach in Libya, and released a video of the group murder.

Radical Islamic terrorist groups are employing barbaric tactics in a jihad, including mass slaughters, beheadings, kidnapping, rape, abductions of women and girls, compelled marriages, forced conversions, destruction of churches and involuntary migrations. The results are devastating, forcing Christians to flee their ancestral lands.

In Iraq, for example, the Christian population has decreased from 1.4 million in 2003 to 275,000 in 2016. In Syria, the number of Christians dropped from 1.5 million to 500,000 in just five years. A similarly large exodus is occurring throughout the region. In the early 20th century, Christians constituted 20 percent of the population of the Middle East; in 2010, they made up only 5 percent; today, it is undoubtedly less. Supreme Knight Carl Anderson, in announcing that the Order gave \$1.9 million in 2016 to support these persecuted peoples, stated that 2017 may be "the decisive year in determining whether many Christian communities throughout the Middle East will continue to exist."

Religious persecution is a worldwide problem, but a region where oppression of Christians is experienced daily is the Holy Land, the place where Christianity began. In that area, which is under Israel's control, Christians must contend with severe restrictions on routine living, especially in the occupied parts of the West Bank, due largely to the separation walls, checkpoints and military procedures that Israel has installed to protect itself from attacks by Palestinian extremists. Religious fundamentalism in the Palestinian areas of the West Bank and in the Gaza Strip, as well as Jewish fundamentalism and settler movement, are also serious concerns. The conditions on travel, education, housing and employment have become so onerous that there has been a large emigration of Christians from the Holy Land.

Today, Bethlehem where Jesus was born, Nazareth where he grew up, and Jerusalem where he died

and resurrected are nearly devoid of Christians. In Jerusalem, where 27,000 Christians lived in 1948, today there are about 5,000. If there is no change, there soon may be no Christians living in the region. The Holy Land with its numerous sites so integral to Christian history then would become nothing more than a spiritual theme park, attractive to pilgrims and tourists, but not hospitable to the Arab Christians whose families have lived there continually since the time of Our Lord.

The persecution of Christians extends beyond the Middle East. Under Caesar's Sword, a global research project on religious persecution, reports that about 200 million Christians around the world are "at risk of physical violence, arrest, torture, even death simply because they live and practice a faith that is not acceptable to the rulers in that part of the world." It has concluded that "Christians are the most widely targeted religious community, suffering terrible persecutions globally," with at least 60 percent of the cases of global religious persecution and 80 percent of all acts of religious discrimination directed against them. Even the Vatican is considered at risk of Islamic State terrorism.

The Pew Research Center, in its recent annual report on Global Restrictions on Religion, noted that government laws targeting religious groups and societal hostilities, including hate speech, harassment, vandalism and violence against individuals of specific religions, increased markedly from 2014 to 2015. In 2015, 40 percent of the countries worldwide were rated to have "very high" or "high" levels of religious hostility. This was up six points from 2014. While the cited countries are in all parts of the world, the highest levels by far of both "government restrictions on religion" and "social hostilities involving religion" were in nations of the Middle East and North Africa, the same regions where ISIS is operating.

Last year, the European Union, the United States and the British Parliament each declared that the persecution of Christians by ISIS is genocide. In spite of these resolutions, the oppression continues, for these governmental bodies have not supported their resolutions with concrete action. Until then, nothing will change.

World leaders can no longer delay. Pronouncements are not enough. To save and protect the Christians of the Middle East, world leaders must take swift and aggressive steps to end this crisis.

Pope Francis, in his Regina Coeli address in 2015, said: Everyone is called to a "spiritual journey of intense prayer, concrete participation, and tangible help in the defense and protection of our brothers and sisters who are persecuted, exiled, killed, and beheaded just for being Christians...They are our martyrs of today, and there are so many, we can say that they are more numerous than in the first centuries."

In his visit to Cairo on April 28, the pope urged participants at an International Conference on Peace to "say once more a firm and clear, 'No!' to every form of violence, vengeance and hatred carried out in the name of religion or in the name of God." He continued, "We have an obligation to denounce violations of human dignity and human rights, to expose attempts to justify every form of hatred in the name of religion, and to condemn these attempts as idolatrous caricatures of God."

The next day at a Mass for 15,000 people, the pope recalled the meeting of the forlorn disciples with Jesus on the road to Emmaus, and how their despair was turned into life, "for when human hope vanishes, divine hope begins to shine in its place." He provided a message of hope, saying that "when we reach the depths of failure and helplessness, when we rid ourselves of the illusion that we are the best, sufficient unto ourselves and the center of our world, then God reaches out to us to turn our night into dawn, our affliction into joy, our death into resurrection."

As a worldwide moral leader, the pope must continue to speak out, urging the heads of the world's major countries to take specific actions to eliminate all religious persecution.

new Grand Knights to become familiar with the state council and its programs.



THE UNITED
STATES HAS AN
UNPRECEDENTED
OPPORTUNITY TO
HALT ROE V. WADE'S
LEGACY OF ABORTION
ON DEMAND

RO-LIFE AMERI-CANS now face a historic opportunity. Not since the Supreme Court decided Roe v. Wade in 1973 has the United States government had so many high-ranking officials who are pro-life.

Consider this: The House majority leader and the speaker of the House are strongly pro-life. So are the Senate majority leader and the chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee. Both the president and the vice president as well as 17 members of their cabinet are pro-life.

Just three days after the inauguration, President Trump signed a presidential memorandum reinstating the Mexico City Policy, which requires that, as a condition for receiving U.S. foreign aid, nongovernmental organizations agree to neither perform nor promote abortion. Then, several days before the March for Life, the House of Representatives

passed Rep. Chris Smith's "No Taxpayer Funding for Abortion Act."

Vice President Pence went from meeting pro-life leaders and speaking at the March for Life to later casting the tie-breaking vote to pass legislation overturning an Obama administration rule blocking states from defunding Planned Parenthood.

The pro-life agenda has had an important place in the first 100 days of the new administration and the new Congress. But that agenda is far from complete.

The Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church, issued by the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace in 2004, describes the right to life as "the first right" (155) and states: "Promoting human dignity implies above all affirming the inviolability of the right to life, from conception to natural death, the first among all rights and the condition for all other rights of the person" (553).

Last August, during our Supreme Convention in Toronto, I stated that we can never hope to build a true culture of life and civilization of love as long as the legal regime of abortion mandated by Roe v. Wade remains in effect — a regime that has resulted in the deaths of an estimated 60 million unborn

children in the United States since 1973.

As the Compendium affirms, "The immediate purpose of the Church's social doctrine is to propose the principles and values that can sustain a society worthy of the human person" (580). And Pope Francis in his encyclical on "care for our common home," Laudato Si', speaks of the need to "safeguard the moral conditions for an authentic human ecology" and to provide the poor with the "right to a life consistent with their inalienable dignity."

The civilization of love rests on respect for the equal dignity and right to life of every person. Human dignity goes beyond abortion. But the right to life is not only a foundation; it can also be a common ground to a broader engagement with society.

Our Knights of Columbus/ Marist polling on abortion has consistently shown that strong majorities of Americans support significant restrictions on abortion. And on some questions, these majorities include majorities of those who describe themselves as "pro-choice."

On Jan. 22, the 44th anniversary of Roe v. Wade, Pope Francis stated, "The Church must never tire of being an advocate for life and must not neglect to proclaim that human life is to be protected unconditionally from the moment of conception until natural death." He went on to encourage participants of the March for Life "to work tirelessly for the building of a civilization of love and a culture of life."

Today, we have in America a new pro-life moment. Now is the time for Catholics and other pro-life Americans to seize this moment to turn the corner on the legacy of Roe v. Wade.

The political stars are aligning in a way as to make change possible. It is time to take up the challenge of Pope Francis to work tirelessly for the building up of a culture of life by advocating for the unborn.

If we do not, then in the words of Shakespeare, "the fault ... is not in our stars, but in ourselves."

The proceeds from it were placed in separate accounts and invested until 1998 when the Patapsco Council No. 1960 Charities was formed. This Charities corporation run by members of our council is a separate entity from the council so that all contributions to it can be tax deductible. It was formed to raise funds for scholarships and the other charities of the Council. One of the funds maintained by this Charities corporation is an endowment account from which the earnings only are used to provide for the scholarships awarded. We have earned over 8% return on this special account, and it currently is used to completely fund our elementary school scholarships. This endowment account has grown from \$5,000 to over \$20,000. This fund receives all personal contributions of \$250 or more to help us always be there for scholarship support.
